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<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

About the Institute "The college emblem bears a line 'Rite Gyananah Muktih" from Upanishad which means, without knowledge liberation is not possible. Knowledge is the sole tool to attain the final liberation in one's life. This reflects wonderful teachings from our Vedic literature which is the exponent for mental and intellectual independence. This concept is one of the precious gifts bestowed upon us by the Upanishad. The ultimate motto of the institution is based upon the above concept which helps to comprehend the subjective knowledge and shape up the personalities of the students of the institution"

Govt. Sukhram Nage college is the only college in the tribal notified Nagri Block providing quality education to the students of the region hailing mostly from remote rural, tribal, educationally and economically backward area. The Institute came into existence on 4th September 1984 with the under graduate course B.A. In subsequent years many more courses were added i.e., B.Com. in 1986, B.Sc. in 1987, M.A. History in 1997, M.A. Hindi in 2005. To pay tribute to Shree Sukhram Nage, the famous freedom fighter of this area, the college was rechristened as Govt. Sukhram Nage College by the state Govt. on 13th June 2008. As per decision of IQAC and demand raised by the student union, post-graduate diploma in computer applications (PGDCA), Geography as a new subject at undergraduate level and new PG courses in Sociology and Political Science were initiated from the session 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19 respectively. In 2018-19 and 2019-20 the number of seats were increased in PGDCA (30 to 40) and Geography (30 to 60) respectively. The college is a co-ed college with majority of students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/BPL category. The institution is fully aware of its prime responsibility of mentoring these students by providing quality in education to empower these students and motivate them by maintaining balance between tradition and modernity, blending skill oriented courses with traditional ones.

Apart from providing value based education and learning, the college strives hard to provide friendly atmosphere for over-all grooming and development of students by various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities .

Vision

To provide quality education to create a zeal among the students of this remote tribal belt to join hands for overall improvement of the society through excellence in education and research. The value based education is the need of the hour, the institution aims to serve as a valuable resource for the country by producing intellectually capable, responsible citizens catering to the overall growth of the country.

- The infrastructural support offered by the Collegetos students is adequate. The college has its own building with all basic amenities (New block constructed and inaugurated in 2017) supportive to good learning environment.
- The NSS wing of the College have been very active and have participated with great enthusiasm in activities like blood donation, health awareness survey, de addiction and literacy programmes etc.
- The college campus is secured with CCTV camera surveillance system.
- The college has Radio Frequencyinternet connectivity, adequate labs, library and internet connectivity through LAN and Wi-Fi.
- One class room and seminar hall is equipped with ICT enabled teaching learning facilities.

- Lack of space will certainly affect the infrastructural development in future, which will be a major obstruction in starting new courses and creating adequate space for research activities. There is also a Paucity of land in the immediate surroundings which can be acquired for the development of the college.

- Laboratories need augmentation
- The number of publications by the faculty needs improvement
- The teacher-taught ratio needs improvement
- Vacant posts of regular teachers in majority of subjects, sports officer, librarian and support staff
- Absence of PG courses in science subjects.
- Lack of research activities.
- The alumni association is not active
- Lack of proper library services.
- Lack of canteen and inadequate cycle stand facility
- The college being situated in a remote rural area, lack of continuous power supply, internet and telephonic connectivity is a big issue

Institutional Opportunity

- The level of academic excellence which the College has acquired makes it possible for our students to get entry into renowned higher education institutes of the state. The College has to devise mechanisms for translating this potential into a reality.
- The new learning methods require greater competence in soft skills among students. The College has to develop necessary technical and infrastructural resources to take this to a higher level.
- The vision of the College makes it imperative to engage in socially relevant programmes such as organising voluntary blood donation camps, AIDS awareness programmes, and cleanliness awareness programmes. The College proposes to ensure students' greater participation in these activities.
- As an affiliated college, the college cannot start new courses on its own. Every year the state Govt. starts new courses in various disciplines, the college has to play a proactive role to get these courses to give better opportunities to the students of the region.

Institutional Challenge

- How to create more space within the campus is one of the major challenges that the college has to deal with a sense of urgency for expansion in future.
- The college has to play a proactive role to fill up the teaching and non-teaching vacancies.
- Preparing students for competing at national level by improving their language proficiency and personality development
- To inculcate good communication abilities (Hindi & English) in students of tribal area.
- To improve ICT infrastructure and internet connectivity.
- To develop, support and nurture research outlook in faculty and students.
- To provide better and cost effective performance in all the aspects of institute's management.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college provides free accessibility to education and equal opportunity to all sections of society without any discrimination of caste, creed or economic status. The college incorporates UGC/ Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University Raipur, Chhattisgarh Government guidelines for developing and restructuring the curriculum. The institution monitors and evaluates the quality of its education and enrichment programmes through Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Planning and Evaluation Board and Janbhagidari Samiti. Apart from regular UG and PG courses a post graduate diploma in Computer Applications (PGDCA) have also been introduced to provide academic flexibility to the students. Some faculties are members of the board of studies, College Development Council and academic council of the affiliating university and autonomous colleges. Use of ICT tools are encouraged for teaching and learning. The cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environment education, human values, ICT are integrated in to the syllabus in a number of subjects. Talks and lectures of eminent speakers are organised to train and create awareness amongst students. The college formally as well as informally obtains feedback from staff members, students, alumni, parents, academic peers and community by conducting meetings, college functions, seminars, workshops, discourses etc.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college is the only college situated in a tribal notified area of Nagri Block. Since its inception, the college has grown slowly but steadily and has earned a reputation for good academic atmosphere that draws aspirants not only from the local urban but also from the remote rural and forest areas spread over in a radius of 20 Km. The college ensures complete transparency in the admission process. The process of admission, number of seats for various courses and all other relevant information is clearly mentioned in the prospectus and the college website. The admission is given strictly as per the norms declared by the government. The students are selected on merit cum basis depending upon the number of seats available for various courses. Reservation policy for admission process is strictly followed. The college is consistently striving to introduce and update students with the latest changing trends in education. Apart from routine ICT based teaching techniques, the college has introduced a new page in its website to upload lecture notes on important topics by the faculty members. The college library is in the process of automation. Some teaching faculties are engaged in research activities and attend workshops, seminars, conferences etc. The college has also developed a feedback mechanism for the evaluation of teachers by students for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college is in constant pursuit of developing scientific temper and research culture. Being an undergraduate college, the research facilities available in the college are inadequate. The college promotes research culture and it takes initiatives to motivate the faculty for their academic enhancement. Faculty is also encouraged to organize and attend National and International Conferences and Workshops to get acquainted with recent trends in their respective fields. The institute is engaged in activities which inculcate social and moral responsibility among the students. Extension and outreach activities are planned and executed by the college keeping in mind the overall curricula of the students. The NSS unit of the college is very much active in initiating extension activities like, awareness camps, cleanliness drives and SVEEP (Systematic Voters' Education and Electoral Participation) programs.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The institution has adequate infrastructural facility with 20 well equipped and ventilated classrooms, 04 science laboratories and one computer laboratory with 20 computers, a seminar hall with ICT facilities, playground, and equipment as per curricular needs and moderate sports equipment. Constant efforts are made to get the latest infrastructure facilities through grants received from UGC/State government and other agencies. The college has a library with more than 20000 books and reading room facilities. Library automation is under process. College has LAN and Wi -fi connectivity. The college has RF internet connectivity which overcomes the slow internet speed and frequent cable problems. The institution ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of the facilities.

Student Support and Progression

In order to provide support to the economically weaker and physically challenged students, the college offers a number of scholarships to the students under various Govt. schemes. Approximately 70-75% of the students are provided financial assistance from state government, central government and other agencies. Special coaching is provided to slow and advanced learners and Divyangjan. The college organizes sports, games, cultural and

extracurricular activities for the students. The career guidance cell of the college trains the students for the job market. Keeping in view the job market the college has introduced skill development courses. The college has an anti- ragging committee governed by the senior staff members of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The primary aim of the college is to give quality education. In order to fulfill this vision into reality our mission is to create a teaching–learning environment and research attitude conducive to the pursuit of higher knowledge. Since it is a government college, all plans and policies are formed as per government rules. Several committees i.e. IQAC, planning and evaluation board, etc have been constituted for proper implementation of existing courses and to conceive and conceptualize new plans and policies to maintain and improve the qualitative standards of the college. The college pays attention to groom leadership in faculty as well as students by encouraging them to organize and participate in seminars, workshops, conferences and training programmes. Non teaching staff is encouraged for computer literacy and other training programmes. A number of opportunities are provided to groom the students such as NSS, sports and other curricular and co-curricular activities. Latest teaching methods: ICT based teaching facility is available. The college has a moderate library with more than 20000 books and INFLIBNET membership. Important lecture notes are also uploaded in the college website. The institution gets financial support from the State Govt, UGC and CGCOST.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college deploys action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum in the following ways:

- The institution follows syllabus of the affiliating university; Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur.
- On institution level the syllabus for each subject & paper is distributed (Syllabus Break-up)
- According to the syllabus breakup class-room management is prepared & followed.
- To ensure timely completion of prescribed syllabus, periodiccheck, feedback is taken and correction is ensured.
- College has adequate classrooms and laboratories to ensure smooth conduction of teaching/learning programmes.
- Vaccant posts of teaching staff is filled by guest lecturers as per norms prescribed from State Govt.
- Periodical checking of student performances and feedback followed by corrective measures is focus of the curriculum delivery system.
- The main thrust (or key point) of this system is to create a learning friendly environment
- The course content is split into two terms in the semester system. i.e. (July- November and January May) where as in annual system the course content is divided into one term i.e. the month of July February, keeping in mind the convenience of the learners. It is ensured that teachers move from easy to difficult, familiar to unfamiliar and at a pace that is easy for learners to maintain.
- At the beginning of each session, an academic calendar of the college is prepared on the basis of academic calendar of university and then heads of departments, in consultation with their faculty members, prepare departmental time table, discuss curriculum and schedule an academic calendar before the commencement of the session.
- Every teacher draws his/her own teaching plan broadly taking into consideration the ability of students.
- A copy of the syllabus is provided to the teachers for ready reference. It is also uploaded in the college website.
- Relevant books are also recommended by the teachers to the students along with the prescribed syllabus.
- Besides the class tests, two mid-term exams are also conducted.
- Parent- Teacher meetings are held in the respective department.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Initiative for students (Advance and Slow learners)

- The student population in college belongs to diverse social/cultural and economical background. Very high percentage of students come from small villages and belong to SC/ST/OBC/BPL category
- The modification of curriculum delivery methods based on students' needs start with identification and management of students. A family like environment has been created to monitor the progress of slow as well as advanced learners. To identify students of various learning ability teachers pay attention to their class work, participation, assessment and attendance.
- Students performing poorly in assessment works (home work, class-tests, term examinations etc.) or regularly absent are consulted and motivated to perform better. Guidance and proper training are provided to such students.
- Daily classroom interaction, unit test and seminar presentation enables the teachers to identify the advance learners. Advance learners are trained to improve their subjective knowledge as well as general awareness and language proficiency. The students of this tribal belt are full of potentials but are very shy and introvert by nature. It needs special efforts to groom their body language and overall personality to match their counterparts at state and national levels. Participating in NSS activities improves their personality in a very natural manner.
- Special books of more advanced level are recommended to them. Liberal library facilities are allowed to advanced learners.
- To make learning student centric, a number of clubs and committees have been constituted so that

students realize their fullest potential to achieve their aim.

- Various lectures, workshops, seminars, conferences, character building camps, Jan-Chetna rallies and the training programmes are organised to impart life skills, and knowledge- management skills.
- The college pools all its resources and raises special funds to provide latest teaching/learning aids along with the reading material to the needy students.
- The evaluation processes of internal examinations are student- friendly and fully transparent.
- To provide equal attention to each learner, class room teaching is focused to be interactive and as per academic calendar. For this teachers use differentiated instructions and encourage participative learning.
- Students are encouraged to learn time management and focus in subject enrichment and exam oriented study throughout the year.
- Since majority of students are from Hindi medium schools, it is an uphill task to inculcate English speaking and writing abilities through practice sessions.
- Students are motivated to learn problem solving, writing & elucidating and time management during exams.
- Special coaching classes are organised to remove their doubts and difficulties.
- Advanced learners are given exclusive guidance to pursue their interests in fields like research, UPSC, State PSC, NET, SET and various competitive exams. However, our faculties are available beyond the classroom hours for guiding both slow as well as advanced learners.

Student Centric Teaching

At Govt. S.N. college Nagri, students have always been the centre of all its academic and co-academic endeavors. All possible efforts are taken to ensure their fullest growth and development in a safe and congenial environment. Right from the time a student enters the portals of the college, he/she is guided, counselled, inspired, motivated, corrected and channelized in the best possible manner. Admission Guidance Cell, Career Counselling Cell, Guidance Cell, remedial classes, concessions, scholarships, awards, incentives, special classes and infrastructure of good standards are meant to groom them and prepare them for the job market as morally upright, socially responsible, and professionally sound human resource.

2.3.4 Innovation and creativity in teaching-learning

Response:

Creativity & Innovation in teaching-

- Teach students where to look do not tell what to see.
- Students are encouraged to learn problem solving through examples and practice sessions. Teaching is focused in two parts – Subject Oriented and Examination oriented.
- Development of articulation abilities and answer writing abilities and speaking abilities through various tests and activities.
- Curriculum teaching is aided with real world examples. Concept learning and understanding is enhanced by the same.
- Along with the conventional teaching, ICT based teaching is also practiced in some subjects.
- Student-centric teaching-learning process has been introduced
- Transparent and student friendly environment
- In science subjects, concepts are elaborated and illustrated in the laboratory by way of experiments as per syllabi.
- To make teaching / learning effective and enjoyable, a combination of traditional and innovative methods is practiced, depending on the requirement of the subject and the mental ability of the learners and making changes according to the latest developments in respective subjects.
- **Teaching Plan** Each department prepares its own teaching plan. The syllabus is discussed and distributed amongst the faculty members in the departmental meetings. Later, every teacher draws his/her teaching plan, broadly taking into consideration, the ability of his/her students and the academic calendar. A teaching diary is maintained which is checked by head of the department and principal of the institution. Time table is prepared and displayed on the notice board.
- Evaluation Blue Print To evaluate the performance of students, oral and written class tests are taken on monthly basis or at the end of the chapters or units. Besides these class tests, mid-term tests are conducted. Towards the end of each session/semester, seminars, projects, theory and practical examinations are conducted.
- Network Resource Free internet facility is available to students trough wi fi network
- Use of ICT Latest teaching aids, such as DLP, computer, and PowerPoint presentations are used for class room teaching and seminar presentations. E-resources like e-PG Pathshala, e_Gyankosh and lecture notes are shared with the students. The college has INFLIBNET membership also which can be accessed by students and staff members of the college to get the advantage of e-resources available in INFLIBNET.
- New Courses Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications (PGDCA) and a new subject Geography at first degree level and M.A. in Sociology and Political Science have been initiated to give more option to the students.
- **Co-curricular Practices** Guest lectures, introduction with higher learner models, graphs, charts, and interactive sessions are a regular feature of many activities organised by the college. The institute ensures the quality of its teaching with introduction of innovative methods. Teachers employ collaboration to assess student's abilities to work as a team, leadership skills, or presentation abilities by conducting group projects and discussions etc.

• **Upgradation of Library** - The college library has more than 20000 books. Online resources like N-list journal are also subscribed by the college.

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Reforms in continuous internal evaluation

- As per the directives of the State Govt. & affiliating university the college engages in continuous internal evaluation through sessional exams and class tests.
- The college follows directives of affiliating university on the matter of internal evaluation.
- The process of internal evaluation is well planned and document. Periodicity is 2 per session
- The question paper is set by respective subject teachers in tune with the trend of university main examination pattern.
- After each test result is analysed and students are provided with feedback to improve their performance. The result forms the basis for classifying students in various focus groups.
- The aims of internal evaluation system are-
- Providing students a preview of university and competitive examination pattern.
- Identifying students as slow or advance learners.

- Providing students an opportunity to test their skills in understanding/writing university question papers.
- Identifying the weakness of the students in terms of language proficiency, content of answer, presentation etc. and guide them to attain perfection.

• Evaluation mechanism

To ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty members are aware of the evaluation processes, the institution takes the following measures:

- The evaluation methods are communicated through the Prospectus, college website Notice Board and through announcements in the class rooms. Details are also available in the university website.
- In the beginning of the session, orientation program is conducted in which all information related to exams and evaluation is narrated to the students.
- The progress of the students is monitored by teachers through class tests, written assignments, oral tests, group discussions and interactive sessions.
- Exam result analysis is done by the college. Corrective measures are taken to improve the overall teaching and learning ambience.
- Evaluation Reforms

The institution follows all instructions as per University Guidelines:-

- As per the affiliating university, the Under Graduate courses follow annual system. I and II term examinations are conducted to acquaint the students about the university examination pattern.
- The PG courses follow semester system. Assignments-based internal assessment is taken in all P.G. courses.
- Results are analyzed by respective departments
- Students are allowed to observe their answer books under the supervision of the subject teacher.
- Effective implementation of Evaluation Reforms

The institution follows the guidelines of affiliating university. The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own through Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Quality Assurance Cell (QAC).

• Assessment Approaches

The following formative and summative evaluation approaches are adopted at curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular front to measure student achievement:

1. Curricular front:

- Special tests for advanced and slow learners are arranged.
- Assignments-based internal assessment is taken in some PG courses.
- Unit tests and Term examinations are conducted for Undergraduate classes.
- Internal assessment tests in each semester are conducted in all postgraduate classes and PGDCA.
- Seminars and assignment based assessment for all PG classes and PGDCA.

2. Co-curricular front (debates, elocution, quiz):

On the Co-curricular front debates, elocution, quiz and other competitions are conducted.

3. Extra-curricular front

Various sports and cultural activities are organized:

- Sports trials are conducted and selected students are trained to represent the college team.
- Students have excelled in various competitions and have won cash prizes and trophies in NSS/Sports activities.

To ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment, the college keeps record of projects assessed internally for two years for any review if ever sought. Internal assessment is of 20 marks each (PG Courses). Ten marks are allotted for seminar and ten marks are given for unit tests. Apart from proficiency in subject, attendance, behavioral aspects, independent learning and communication skills etc. are also taken care of while marking the internal assessment. On demand the students are allowed to see their answer books and note the deficiencies as mentioned by the subject teacher. Similar procedure is adapted for the UG classes' term examinations. The answer books of meritorious students are exhibited for students of PG courses.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Description of mechanism to deal with examination related grievances-

- Exam related grievance are dealt with case by case basis by a redressal committee constituted for the purpose
- All grievances related to internal examinations are dealt by respective subject teachers. Focus is to provide feedback and correction of mistakes and train the students for university examination.
- Grievance related to university exams are forwarded to affiliating university through proper channel. In this course the HEI works as a bridge between university and student.
- Every grievance is treated with care and due importance. The students are provided with complete guidance and support in this regard.
- Grievance redressal procedure is understood as an important function of the institute and it is executed with due care and diligence.

The attainment of Course Outcome is measured through continuous evaluation of students. For this the concerned teacher, after completion of a particular topic, conducts a discussion in which the level of understanding of topic is gained. In next step the students are evaluated through assignments, quizzes and tests for the specific topic.

The ultimate check of attainment of objectives is through mid-term and sessional exams (Conducted by HEI) and then the final exam (conducted by affiliating university). Similarly for practical subject, the concerned students are prepared for the exam by carefully monitoring them during practical sessions. In each step the faculty provides feedback to students so as to improve the performance and understanding of the course.

As for the attainment of programme outcome, it can be stated that the percentage is increasing, which is evident by increasing number of students in PG classes and more and more students are following further studies after graduation. As for the PG courses, the effect is also positive in older courses. For newly introduced courses, it remains to be seen after graduation of maiden batch.

The college has two teaching blocks. The old block has 15 class rooms with a seating capacity of 30 to 60 students and the new block has 05 big class rooms including one seminar hall with a seating capacity of 80 to 150 students. The class rooms are well lit, ventilated and have adequate seating arrangements and are equipped with good quality green boards.

• The college has 05 laboratories with moderate facilities. All basic science labs are constantly augmented as per syllabi and availability of funds. To be prepared for any inadvertent situation, the laboratories are also provided with fire fighting equipment.

The college has 15 computers with LAN and internet facilities and with licensed OS. Another 10 computers are proposed to be purchased in the current session. Adequate ICT facilities are available in the college for teaching and learning.

The college library (equipped with N-List) is available for the students and staff members. Other online databases such as SCOPUS can be availed by the faculty through affiliating University. Apart from these, faculty can search online scientific database providers and browse through an array of sites made available by the INFLIBNET e-Resources section. Each and every faculty of our institution has a personal ID and password in order to access all the e-resources available through INFLIBNET.

The college library has 21000 reference and text books and it is divided into 4 sections – Student section, News Paper section, Reading room and Storage. The e-resources are made available to the students in the computer laboratory once the practical classes are over.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

The policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure and its maintenance to facilitate effective teaching and learning is chalked out by the planning and evaluation board, comprising of principal and heads of departments. Keeping in view the current dynamics of effective teaching and learning as per the demands of various courses, the planning and evaluation board and IQAC makes a policy to create and update the existing infrastructure. The infrastructural facilities are reviewed periodically for upgradation and maintenance.

The policy is implemented by various departments as per the decision taken by the Planning and Evaluation Board. All civil works are undertaken by building committee with the help of public works department (PWD) of state government. These committees coordinate between various departmental requirements and government departments like CSEB, PWD, BSNL etc. Constant efforts are made to get the latest infrastructural facilities from all kinds of resources like UGC,RUSA,SF Courses state government and other agencies. All purchases are monitored by the purchase committee strictly adhering to UGC/state government purchase rules.

The institution ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of the facilities. During last four years, a number of infrastructural facilities have been added:

- Being a government college, the maintenance of building is done by the public works department. The college has spent Rs. 31200 (Thirty One thousand two hundred only) From UGC general development fund during the 12th five year plan for maintenance of equipment.
- The electronic equipment are maintained through AMC and on call basis
- The examination form forwarding fees, received from the affiliating university is utilized for maintenance of furniture, light fittings etc.
- Maintenance of equipment and computers is done through special allocation of UGC, Janbhagidari, self-finance fund.
- Janbhagidari funds have been used for the purchase of furniture and computers.
- From time to time, the state government provides grants for the purchase and maintenance of equipment.

Some of the available infrastructural facilities are: Clean, well maintained Class rooms, Seminar Hall with LCD Projector, Computer Lab with Projector, Power Backup and Internet Connectivity through RF. College has 24 hrs. CCTV survillance.

• The science laboratories are well equipped to cater to the students need as per the syllabus. All labs are updated by the UGC GD grant, JBS, Self-financed fund and annual allocation received from the

State Govt.

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

Two examples of best practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives

1. Extension of College Building

The college was shifted to its existing building in the year 2008. Since then the infrastructural augmentation was not significant but the student strength increased constantly and the college has a present strength of 1069. The inadequacy of space for study and future expansion needs was discussed in IQAC meeting and it was decided to initiate for the construction of new teaching block with modern amenities. As per decision of the IQAC, the college has put forward the proposal in the session 2015-16 which was sanctioned and a grant of Rs. 1 Crore was released in 2016-17. The inauguration of extension building was slated in the session 2017-18. This extension building now houses lecture rooms for arts and science UG streams, a fully functional seminar hall. A smart class room is also proposed under a project initiated by department of Higher education.

1. Introduction of new courses

Since 2006, no new courses were sanctioned to the college. Due to financial constraints, students of the region are not in a position to take admission in colleges of other city/state. It was a big problem and a major reason for the termination of education of the students of the region after graduation. In this tribal area students and young graduates rarely get exposure to computer operating and programming skills. The IQAC of this institute had foreseen this deficiency and understanding the need of imparting job-oriented skills to young students of this area, proposed the start of a new job oriented course PGDCA as self-financed from the session 2016-17. PGDCA course provides students a chance to hone their skills of computer applications, programming, handling projects and presentation skills.

IQAC in its meeting unanimously decided to pursue for the introduction of other new courses as per

student enrollment and local needs. As per decision of IQAC and college JBS, following new courses were introduced after due approval from the department of higher education and the affiliating university -

- 2. Establishment of LAN and its upgradation In 2015-16. The campus was converted in a wi-fi campus and in 2017 the internet connection was enhanced with the introduction of R.F-connectivity to get rid of the frequent break-down of internet services and lower speeds due to cable problems.

1. The college has dustbins in all corridors and important areas of the college.

Transparency in financial, academic, administrative & auxiliary functions-

- The institute works under the guidance of various administrative committees like JBS, Staff council and purchase committee. Similarly the institute gets directives from Higher education ministry of state, Department of Higher education & Affiliating university.
- For financial operations the accounts are subjected to periodic audits from state govt. and A.G.
- The academic transparency is maintained by continuous observation & monitoring of academic pursuits/activities in college through staff council and IQAC. The process of internal exam, practical exams/internal assessment is transparent. The evaluated copies of internal assessment are shown to students for feedback.
- The administrative directives are controlled by JBS of the institute. Which includes outside authorities (people representatives) similarly IQAC also includes external representatives (govt. officials/parent representatives/local body representatives). Both these cells/committees are subjected to audits.
- Other activities sports/NSS/red cross/cultural/non-academic activities are managed by respective councils and committees. these committees induce student representatives to encourage participative management and transparency.
- The complete management of college is under RTI act 2005 hence all statutory bodies adhere to state govt. and university norms also utmost transparency is maintained.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe at least two institutional best practices (as per NAAC Format)

Response:

Best Practice – I

EMPOWERING GIRLS IN TRIBAL AREA THROUGH EDUCATION

OBJECTIVES – The purpose of education is to empower one's mind, open doors of opportunity, impart skills that enable one to grow and become self-dependent. When a girl gets educated, the entire family gets educated hence empowering girl by education in this tribal area is a worthy objective.

CONTEXT – In past decade or so, more specifically after the formation of the new state Chhattisgarh, a number of new colleges were established to make education accessible and within reach of one and all. In tribal area though, the scenario is totally different. There are so many socio-economic constraints that deprive the girl students to pursue higher education which is the main reason for poor GER in these areas. At the same time the opportunity of higher education in these areas is like liberating force, which opens various new channels of development. The process of this objective was started as a programme to improve the enrolment percentage of school students in higher education, the emphasis was to work upon the dropout rate of girls.

PRACTICE – The programme involves a motivational presentation and interactive session with the students of higher secondary class in various streams at major schools of Nagri. The content includes various opportunities in Higher education including associated job opportunities .The activity schedule is as follows –

- The day of the program is fixed with consultation with authorities of the school. The notice of the programme is widely spread to ensure maximum participation of the target group.
- Facilitators from HEI, of Assistant Professor Rank visit the school to manage the preparation for presentation.
- The programme consists of two parts
 - Presentation by facilitator The presentation consists of all the vital information about HE information of courses, future prospectus of each discipline, guidelines and information about rules and regulations in clear and concise manner.
 - Interaction In this section the facilitator encourages the participants to ask questions and doubts regarding higher education courses offered by the college and eligibility criteria of various courses. All the queries are attended so that the prospective students get encouraged to pursue higher education. The courses offered in nearby colleges are also discussed. Job prospects of different courses are also discussed.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS – The number of enrolment in higher education (for girl child) is ever increasing, specially Tribal students .

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

- 1.Problem of reach HEI has reach in Nagri proper and a radius of 10 Kms. Some students also come from a distance of 20 Kms. This being the only college in this tribal block, the distance and financial factors are major constraints in increasing the catchment area.
- 2.Problem of Resources Sufficient resources, manpower, equipment for presentation etc. are required. The geographic position and lack of of Nagri is alsoat a distance of 140 Kms from the affiliating university and 64 Kms from the district headquarters.

NOTE – The HEI is working tirelessly to educate and empower girl child of this tribal area, for this purpose, introduction of new courses and strengthening of infrastructure is an ongoing process. For us providing opportunity of development through higher education is a worthy endeavour and we as a team are committed to the same.

Best Practice – II

SOCIAL SERVICE THROUGH NSS

The NSS (National Service Scheme) unit of this HEI works in the area of social service and welfare of society (ISR activities) through annual camps, social service drives and other channels.

OBJECTIVES – A higher education institute not only provides education but also endeavours to inculcate leadership qualities and social responsibilities in young citizens of the country. To achieve this goal the NSS unit of this college is working steadily and providing ample opportunities to students to gain on-hand experience in this regard. In this remote tribal notified area, it was observed that awareness programmes and sensitization programmes may play an important role in much needed social reforms.

CONTEXT – The National Service Scheme is a programme initiated by the central Govt. The college is a member of this programme since 1986. The routine programmes covered under the scheme is monitored by the programme coordinator of the affiliating university. The motto of NSS is social service through education and education through social service.

PRACTICE – Volunteers (Students) are enrolled in NSS schemes at the start of each session. Each volunteer has to participate in activities for at least 2 years. The activities include social works, welfare camps, various activity drives in the locality and chosen area (preferably nearby villages). The main event of each session is a 7 day camp which is planned in a village in coordination with the concerning gram panchayat.

In these camps, cadets participate in various activities targeted to the social welfare of camp-site village and residents. Following are the activities which are taken up during the 7 days camp -

- 1. **Small construction works** levelling, renovation/reconstruction of unpaved roads, construction or renovation of community places like chowpal, cultural stage, soak–pits, temples etc.
- 2. Cleanliness drives Cleaning and excavation of ponds, drinking water supply area, streets and drainage system. This activity also include awareness campaign on cleanliness and hygiene.
- 3. Group discussion On deaddiction, illiteracy, health, unemployment etc. Various experts in social welfare area also interact with cadets and villagers.
- 4. Awareness Programs Door to door campaign with data collection, and awareness about social issues and health issues.
- 5. Welfare camps Health check-up camps, veterinary camps and agriculture camps are also organized.
- 6. **Cultural programmes** The cadets also present cultural programmes focussed on social messages on deaddiction, illiteracy, importance of cleanliness and health and hygiene.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS – The NSS programme has two fold impact. Not only it provides a chance for young volunteers to learn various social skills but also it provides an excellent window to observe problems in society and work as a team to overcome the same. The participants sensitize with problems, learn team work, leadership and appreciate the simple lives of farmers/villagers. Also it provides the institute an opportunity to serve the nearby community by social welfare activities. The details of NSS camps organised during last five years is given below –

In fact, there is a healthy competition among the nearby villages to invite the college for organising NSS camp in their village.

ACHIEVEMENTS - The NSS unit of this college is popular on social welfare front and has won various accolades and awards from social establishments. In session 2016-17, the NSS unit of the college was awarded with a cash prize of Rs. 25000 by the affiliating university for significant contribution in the social front.
